**Las Vegas**

**Boston**

Jean and her family recently travelled to Boston, one of America's oldest colonial cities. Boston is rich in history. During their visit, Jean and her family appreciated learning about Boston's role during the American Revolution.

In the city, Jean and her family followed the famous Freedom Trail. This is a 2.5-mile route where tourists can visit 16 different, historically important places, located throughout the city. Famous places on this trail include the Paul Revere House, King's Chapel, and the Bunker Hill Memorial. Jean and her family got a map to navigate the Freedom Trail. The roads were clearly marked by red lines, and there were signs throughout the city to help Jean's family and other tourists find the way.

### A. The centre of Paris

On the Île de la Cité, in front of the Cathedral of Notre Dame, there is a compass set in the pavement. From here, all distances from Paris are measured. And at the heart of Paris is the River Seine. 'For Parisians the Seine is a compass, a way to know where you are,' says art historian Marina Ferretti. The river is an essential part of Parisian life. There are 199 houseboats on the river in Paris. One day, 34 years ago, Claude Tharreau was walking along the Seine when he saw a long boat called the Cathare for sale. 'I had been looking for an apartment,' he says. It was Sunday. On Wednesday he signed the contract. 'It was only afterwards that I noticed it was a boat with no electricity or water.'

### B. The urban Riviera

During the summer, the Seine becomes an urban Riviera, a constant movement of beach-volleyball players, sand-castle artists, dancers of Samba, Tango, and Break Dance, different musicians and of course sunbathers. Project manager Damien Masset knows what is needed for the perfect beach: tons of sand, many umbrellas, chairs, tables, ice-cream stalls and cafés.

### C. No swimming authorized

It's one of those hot summer days, the river looks cool and inviting. 'Can you swim in the Seine?' I ask the police commandant Sandrine Berjot. 'No,' she says. '38 euros.' That's the fine for swimming. 'What about putting your feet in?' 'You can't do that.' She also tells me that 'if someone is drowning, you mustn't jump into the water. But you do have to call the police.' If you don't do that, the fine is up to 75,000 euros or five years in jail.

### D. The river

The river has also been a source of inspiration for famous French painters: Claude Monet kept a floating studio on the river near Argenteuil. Henri Matisse also had a studio on the Quai Saint-Michel. In their art we can see the constantly changing and dancing light of the river.
